## A New European Experience

A New European Experience for Debate

During their stay in Romania, participants took part in various activities. They visited the Romanian Parliament, met the Mayor of Iași, explored the city, and tasted traditional Romanian food. These experiences helped them connect with each other and better understand Romanian culture before the competition.

Before the official debate rounds, a demonstration match was held. Romanian teachers formed the debate teams, ensuring participants interacted with a variety of people. This helped students make new friends and collaborate across cultural boundaries.

On November 21, 2024, students from Serbia, Romania, Macedonia, Spain, and Portugal gathered in Iași for a multinational debate competition. They debated the resolution “Lowering the voting age to 16” in Public Forum format, where two-person teams present arguments and respond to counter-arguments.

The event lasted about four hours, allowing participants to practice their speaking and critical thinking skills.

The competition was judged by a mixed judge, consisting of a Romanian teenager and a teacher from another country. This structure ensured fair evaluations and encouraged diverse perspectives. The students gained valuable experience in expressing opinions clearly, collaborating internationally, and making new friends.

This event is an important step in promoting debate and international cooperation. We hope future Erasmus+ partnerships will continue to engage young people in such activities





# Demonstrative debate

On the 20th of November 2024, there was a debate on the topic of ecological issues in the modern world. Among the participants, there were Radu Popescu and Iacob Dan Arthur, both from seventh grade. The event brought to light concerning issues regarding the state of our planet right now, with the two teams presenting relevant arguments and offering an impactful performance. One of the highly argued topics was the question "Should Ecological Education be a priority in Romanian schools?" I personally sided with the first team, which claimed that, as students' programs are already loaded, there should be no more pressure put on them by having another subject introduced.

I appreciated the interesting topic, and despite not being able to stay until the very last minute of the debate due to classes, it was, in my opinion, a great presentation overall. I am looking forward to similar activities in the future, as the arguments made by the team I personally don't agree with helped me view the topic in an entirely new light and perspective, which I think is the essence of a great debate.

In my opinion, this project helped, through this type of activities, to improve the participants' speaking skills, self-confidence, and their public speaking skills as well, as they are strongly related to the experience you have. It also helps students become aware of the problems our generation faces nowadays and stimulates them to think of productive solutions as well.



# The European Quiz

The Portuguese team in the Young People Matter project, organized for all the groups participating (N. Macedonia, Spain, Serbia, Portugal and Romania), a quiz about European institutions, on the platform Quizizz.com. It took place in the Events Hall of Colegiul Național Iași, on Thursday, the 19th of November 2024. The Portuguese teachers and students made sure we knew how to use it and log in, and explained that it worked a lot like Kahoot, which got everyone excited to play.

The energy in the room was contagious. Whether it was a quick-fire answer or a funny debate over the right choice, every team was fully engaged. Even when the questions got a little challenging, everyone stayed positive and kept the atmosphere lighthearted. It was amazing to see how well the students worked together, pooling their knowledge and supporting each other.

As the quiz went on, it became clear that the Romanian team was in the lead, consistently answering correctly and staying on top of the scoreboard. But, even though there was a bit of friendly competition, everyone was cheering for each other, happy to be part of such an exciting and educational experience. In the end, the Romanian team won the quiz, and their victory was celebrated with a round of applause from all the other teams.

However, the real win was the sense of friendship and the fun we all had. The quiz wasn't just about being the fastest or getting the most answers right—it was about learning together, celebrating what we had already learned, and connecting with our fellow students from different countries. The event wrapped up with lots of smiles, laughter, and a feeling of pride for everyone involved.

My friends and I really enjoyed this experience because it helped us improve our general knowledge and geography skills in such a fun way. We didn't expect to learn so much, but as we played, we started remembering things we didn't even know we knew! It was awesome how the quiz made learning feel like a game.

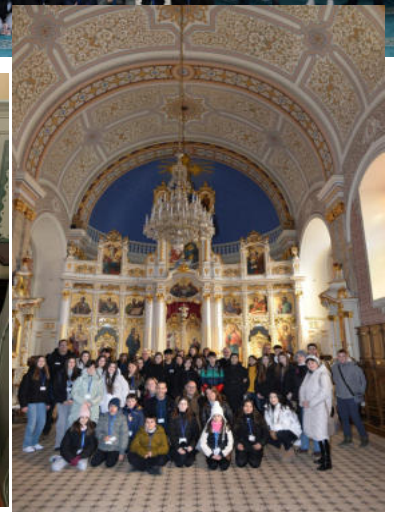

# Subotica sightseeing and visiting the host school

On the first day,, we visited the City Hall where we were welcomed by Nenad Ostojić, a member of the City Council responsible for education. Since the project focuses on mutual respect and appreciation of diversity, we visited the Cathedral of St. Teresa of Avila, Paulinum, Muhadžir Mosque, the Orthodox Church of the Holy Ascension of the Lord, and the Franciscan Church. Then we showed them the school atrium, a clone of the Gubac linden tree, straw paintings that adorn the school hallways, and we talked about numerous collaborations both in the country and abroad. Then the students demonstrated rolanje - an old way of ironing, Bunjevac folk costumes, and the school museum. After that, a workshop was held, the aim of which was to show project participants methods and strategies for overcoming the fear of public speaking.



## Visit to RTV Vojvodina and Novi Sad

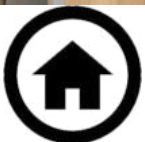

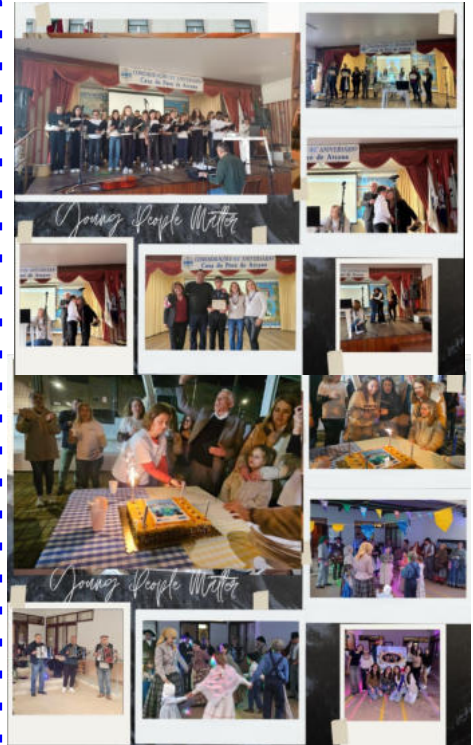
## My experience as one of the presenters!
